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From the CSTC President

Hello, and happy November!

Hopefully you're taking this downtime to catch up on everything that was pushed aside in the mad dash to the finish line. I personally have some home projects to wrap up before the holidays. I won't say that my living room has been half-painted since February, but I won't say that it hasn't, either...

I was really hoping to use this month's article to chat about our relationship with our Stakeholder Liaison's office and share information about all of the local liaisons for the state, but some scammers had to show up and ruin my plans. So instead, I get to talk about ways we can spot scams that come via email or text.

If you were one of the individuals who received an email from "me" recently you already know what I'm talking about. Periodically scammers will pull information from the Board of Directors page of our website and begin sending emails masquerading as members of the board and asking for money in the form of gift cards. This is not unique to our organization, and unfortunately it has become sort of a fact of life now.

If you receive an email from someone claiming to be me, and this is very important, I will never begin a communication, professional or otherwise, with the word "howdy." I generally try to keep my communications a touch more professional, though once we become friends you may get a "hey," or maybe even a "yo." If you get an email from me that begins with "howdy," you can just go ahead and block that sender.

Here are a few best practices for protecting ourselves from internet scammers:

- ALWAYS check the email address. Some sophisticated scammers can spoof an email and send messages from a legitimate account, but often they don't even bother with that. If you get an email asking for money, make sure to confirm the email address.
- Beware of messages that have a sense of urgency to them. Be suspicious of messages where the sender says not to call. I once received a scam email from a past CSTC president saying that they couldn't call because they were in a meeting... while we were sitting next to each other at a board meeting!
- Watch out for messages asking for gift cards. Gift cards are one of the ways that criminals get their hands on money that cannot be recovered once the scam has been revealed.
- NEVER click on an attachment from an unknown email. Many scammers use email attachments or links to install malware on your systems.
- Make sure your operating systems are up to date. Not installing updates can leave your system open to threats.

On a related note, it's PTIN renewal time which means we all have to acknowledge that we have a written information security plan (WISP). Now is a great time to revisit your plan and make sure that it is comprehensive and up to date. It's also a good time to think about adding cyber insurance for your practice.

It is important to be vigilant. There are bad actors out there who want to steal your data.

Beware of Phishing!

How to Avoid Email or Text Scammers

Scammers use email or text messages to trick you into giving them your personal information. They may try to steal your passwords, account numbers, or Social Security numbers. If they get that information, they could gain access to your email, bank, or other accounts. Scammers launch thousands of phishing attacks like these every day — and they're often successful. Scammers often update their tactics, but there are some signs that will help you recognize a phishing email or text message.

What is phishing? When scammers (phishing scammers) use ghost/fraudulent emails, texts, phone calls, and remote access attacks to get the unknowing public to share personal information including account numbers, login information, Social Security Numbers, financial information, gain access to your computer or network. They use a number of tools to steal money, identities, or both.

Here are other tips to help safeguard against phishing scammers:

- Be cautious about opening attachments or clicking on links in emails. Many times the fraudulent emails will look like they are from someone you know. Such links can contain malware or ransomware that can lock you out of your computer or worse. A remote attack targets an individual computer or network as the cybercriminal exploits weaknesses in security settings to access the devices. Another line of attack uses malware to download malicious code that gives criminals access to the network. Especially vulnerable are wireless networks, including mobile phones, modems, and router devices, printers, fax machines and televisions that retain their factory-issued password settings. Sometimes, these devices have no protection at all.
- If a person or organization emails you a link, search online for the Website or other information contained in the email to verify it is not a scam.
- Do not respond to emails requesting personal or financial information without picking up the telephone and verifying with the person or entity making the request.

- Do not respond to emails and text requesting you to purchase gift cards without picking up the telephone and verifying with the person or entity making the request.
- Keep your security up to date and run periodic deep scans to search for viruses or malware.
- Turn on two-factor authentication for accounts that support it and strengthen passwords.
- Always check the email address!!! Typically spammers will use a familiar name, but when you look at the email it has nothing to do with that person. That is an easy way to know it is spam.

What to do if you receive a suspicious email or text

Unfortunately, these scams are a fact of life in our digital age, and we must be vigilant before responding. If you receive an suspiscious email or text, make sure to always check the email address of the sender. If the email address is unfamiliar or doesn't match with contact information familiar to you, that is a good indication that it is a scam.

Ask yourself if the request and urgency makes sense. Have you spoken with the person by phone? If not, proceed with caution

- 1. Don't reply.
- 2. Don't open any attachments. They can contain malicious code that may infect your computer or mobile phone.
- 3. Don't click on any links. Visit our <u>identity protection</u> page if you clicked on links in a suspicious email or website and entered confidential information.
- 4. Send the full email headers or forward the email as-is to phishing@irs.gov if the suspicious phishing email is claiming to be from the IRS. Phishing emails that are not IRS related to your internet service provider's abuse department. Don't forward screenshots or scanned images of emails because this removes valuable information.
- 5. Delete the original email.

What if I receive a phishing email that is not IRS or tax-related? (updated Jan. 19, 2024)

Phishing emails that are not IRS, Treasury and tax-related should **not** be sent to phishing@irs.gov. If you receive a suspicious phishing email not claiming to be from the IRS, forward the email as-is to <u>reportphishing@antiphishing.org</u>, your internet service provider's abuse department, and to the <u>Federal Trade Commission</u>. If you receive an **email** you suspect **contains malicious code** or a malicious attachment and you **HAVE** clicked on the link or downloaded the attachment, visit <u>OnGuardOnline.gov</u> to learn what to do if you suspect you have malware on your computer. If you receive an **email** you suspect **contains malicious code** or a malicious attachment and you **HAVE NOT** clicked on the link or downloaded the attachment, forward the email to your internet service provider's abuse department.

IRS hires new Associate Chief Counsel to focus on partnerships and other passthrough entities

IR-2024-284, Oct. 29, 2024 — The IRS today announced the selection of the first Associate Chief Counsel for the newly created Passthroughs, Trusts and Estates office that will focus exclusively on partnerships, S corporations, trusts and estates. Staffing for this office will be drawn from the current Passthroughs and Special Industries office.

National Cybersecurity Awareness Month reminder: IRS and Security Summit supply online safety tips

IR-2024-283, Oct. 28, 2024 — As National Cybersecurity Awareness Month concludes and preparation for next tax season begins, the Internal Revenue Service and its Security Summit partners today reminded taxpayers to be wary of online threats like identity theft and fraud.

IRS relief now available to flood victims in the Juneau area; multiple deadlines postponed to May 1, 2025

IR-2024-282, Oct. 25, 2024 — The IRS today announced disaster tax relief for individuals and businesses in the Juneau area of Alaska, affected by flooding that began on Aug. 5, 2024.

<u>Treasury, IRS issue final regulations for the Advanced Manufacturing Production Credit</u>

IR-2024-281, Oct. 24, 2024 — The Department of the Treasury and the Internal Revenue Service today issued final regulations to provide guidance for the Advanced Manufacturing Production Credit established by the Inflation Reduction Act of 2022 (IRA).

<u>Treasury and IRS issue guidance for the Energy Efficient Home Improvement Credit</u>

IR-2024-280, Oct. 24, 2024 — The Department of the Treasury and the Internal Revenue Service today issued Revenue Procedure 2024-31 and proposed regulations to provide guidance for the energy efficient home improvement credit.

IRS reminder to disaster area taxpayers with extensions: Parts of 8 states need to file 2023 returns by Nov. 1; others have until Feb. 3 or May 1

IR-2024-279, Oct. 23, 2024 — Now that the Oct. 15 extension deadline has come and gone, the Internal Revenue Service today reminded disaster-area taxpayers who received extensions to file their 2023 returns that, depending upon their location, their returns are due on Nov. 1, 2024, Feb. 3, 2025, or May 1, 2025.

IRS encourages all taxpayers to sign up for an IP PIN for the 2025 tax season

IR-2024-278, Oct. 23, 2024 — As the 2025 tax season approaches, the IRS encourages all taxpayers to take an important step to safeguard their identity by signing up for an identity protection personal identification number (IP PIN).

<u>Treasury, IRS grant filing exception for tax-exempt organizations from filing new Form 4626, Alternative Minimum Tax - Corporations</u>

IR-2024-277, Oct. 23, 2024 — The Department of the Treasury and the Internal Revenue Service today granted a filing exception for tax-exempt organizations; they do not have to file Form 4626, Alternative Minimum Tax – Corporations, for tax year 2023.

IRS announces launch of pass-through compliance unit in LB&I; new group brings together teams of specialists from across the agency to tackle large or complex exams

IR-2024-276, Oct. 22, 2024 — The IRS today announced the new pass-through field operations unit announced last fall has officially started work in its Large Business and International (LB&I) division to more efficiently conduct audits of pass-through entities.

IRS and Treasury issue guidance on implementation of advanced manufacturing investment credit

IR-2024-275, Oct. 22, 2024 — The Department of the Treasury and the Internal Revenue Service today issued final regulations that provide guidance regarding the implementation of the Advanced Manufacturing Investment Credit, established by the CHIPS Act of 2022.

IR-2024-274, Oct. 22, 2024 — The Internal Revenue Service today announced that Preparer Tax Identification Number (PTIN) renewals for 2025 are now being processed.

IRS warns taxpayers of charity scams following recent hurricanes; provides tools to help people verify legitimate groups

IR-2024-269, Oct. 15, 2024 — In the aftermath of Hurricanes Milton and Helene, the Internal Revenue Service today cautioned taxpayers of scammers who use fake charities to gather sensitive personal and financial data from unsuspecting donors.

IRS relief now available to Watch Fire victims in the San Carlos Apache Tribe in Arizona; multiple deadlines postponed to Feb. 3, 2025

IR-2024-268, Oct. 11, 2024 — The Internal Revenue Service today announced disaster tax relief for individuals and businesses of the San Carlos Apache Tribe in the state of Arizona affected by the Watch Fire that began on July 10, 2024.

IRS announces extension of time for certain applicable entities to make an elective payment election on Form 990-T

IR-2024-263, Oct. 10, 2024 — The IRS announced today continued progress on Employee Retention Credit claims, with processing underway on about 400,000 claims, representing about \$10 billion of eligible claims.

IRS releases 2022 tax gap projections; voluntary compliance rate among taxpayers remains steady

IR-2024-262, Oct. 10, 2024 — The Internal Revenue Service today released the tax gap projections for tax year 2022, a detailed analysis showing the nation's projected gross tax gap at \$696 billion. This reflects the difference between projected 'true' tax liability and the amount of tax that is actually paid on time.

<u>Treasury and IRS issue proposed regulations providing clarity regarding the federal tax classification of entities entirely owned by Tribal governments</u>

IR-2024-261, Oct. 7, 2024 — The Department of the Treasury and the IRS today issued proposed regulations addressing the federal tax classification of corporations or LLCs that are owned entirely by Indian Tribal governments (Tribes) and formed under the laws of the Tribes that own them. Generally, entities formed under the laws of a Tribe are known as Tribal law entities.

IRS reminds taxpayers of Oct. 15 tax-filing extension deadline; combat zones, disaster areas, Israel have more time

IR-2024-260, Oct. 7, 2024 — The Internal Revenue Service today encouraged taxpayers to file their 2023 tax year federal income tax return on or before the upcoming Tuesday, Oct. 15, 2024, deadline to avoid possible late filing penalties.

<u>Treasury and IRS issue final regulations identifying syndicated conservation easement transactions as abusive tax transactions</u>

IR-2024-259, October 7, 2024 — The Department of the Treasury and the Internal Revenue Service today issued final regulations identifying certain syndicated conservation easement transactions as "listed transactions" – abusive tax transactions that must be reported to the IRS.

IRS Direct File set to expand availability in a dozen new states and cover wider range of tax situations for the 2025 tax filing season

IR-2024-258, Oct. 3, 2024 — The Internal Revenue Service announced today that Direct File will be available for the 2025 tax filing season in double the number of states than last year's pilot, and it will cover a wider range of tax situations, greatly expanding the number of taxpayers eligible to use the free e-filing service.

<u>Treasury and IRS issue guidance on long-term, part-time employees in 403(b) retirement plans and announce delayed applicability date for related final 401(k) regulation</u>

IR-2024-257, Oct. 3, 2024 — The Department of the Treasury and the Internal Revenue Service today issued guidance addressing long-term, part-time employees in 403(b) retirement plans under the SECURE 2.0 Act, which applies to 403(b) plans beginning in 2025.
